Welcome to our very special newsletter as we celebrate the 20th anniversary of Higher Ground Australia's inaugural gathering in The Grampians, Victoria, in October 2001.

Initially started by Mark Capper and called Higher Ground, the Australian Friends of John Denver in May, 2001, our first gathering was made up of a group of people, who up until that first October, had never met except online.

Within minutes, we became firm friends and formed a strong foundation to our group, which later became Higher Ground Australia. The shorter title, our regular newsletters and me being nominated group leader happened eighteen years ago in 2003. We have weathered many storms over the years; members have come and gone, some have passed from this world, whilst others have quietly stepped back. From such humble beginnings, I did not realise that we would, over the years, become a globally-recognised and well-respected group.

I'm sure that the key to our success thus far was to keep things simple, to enjoy each other's company as we celebrate the life and music of John Denver. Over the years, our annual fundraisers have raised many thousands of dollars for raptor rehabilitation in Victoria, New South Wales, and Queensland. We've also managed to raise awareness of John's music to younger people through the donation of the Dawn Publications series of picture books to many schools across Australia. And most importantly, we have planted at least one hundred trees across our jurisdictions to honour John and to strive for peace. As

years passed, so did some of our beloved members, each of whom have trees planted in their honour.

HGA has provided many opportunities, has introduced us to people from all walks of life across the globe, many of whom have become true and lifelong friends. Our lives were enhanced when we met Max Moore, John's Australian tour manager in 2005. Max's 'John' stories were legendary. One thing that stands out is that no matter who I have met over the years or where I have had conversations with people, almost everyone from my era has a 'John Denver' story to tell. From the Canadian historian and musician who sang 'Poems, Prayers and Promises' at a politician's funeral to the security guard at the 1977 concert at Melbourne's Myer Music Bowl and the ordinary person in the street who had a brief encounter with him personally, there is a common theme as they recount their stories; that John was the nicest person they had ever met. That in itself is a legacy that most people would like to own.

But the success that HGA has had for the past twenty years is not mine. It belongs to each and every one of our members who have, over the past twenty years, given much time, expertise, donated goods and money, and most importantly, supported each other. I cannot guarantee that HGA will continue for another twenty years, but we will be around for quite some time to come.

On this twentieth anniversary of Higher Ground Australia, I would like to acknowledge all of the members who have passed away. I cannot name them all, but there are some who are close to our hearts and warrant a special mention; our founding member, Margaret Gilby, Max Moore, and Sandra Horwell, all of whom contributed much to HGA. Steve Weisberg, whom some of us met in person for the first time in 2012, and who quickly became true friends to us all collectively and individually, Susan Leaver from New Zealand, my Colorado mate, Pat Feldmeier, and more recently Billy Jacobs, who will be sadly missing from Aspen this year.

It's hard to believe that when we first gathered near Hall's Gap on October 12, 2001 that twenty years later, we would be in the middle of a global pandemic and that our borders would be firmly closed; that Australians would not be able to attend the AIO events in 2021, nor would we be able to host our

annual gathering for the second year in a row. However, we would like to extend warm wishes for the events taking place in Aspen this year. We truly hope that those gathering there enjoy their time together and make a special effort to visit the sanctuary and pray for a time that we shall once again gather together to celebrate the music of our beloved John Denver.

PACIFIC GROVE PLAQUE

From Rachel of the Carmel Valley to Judy Therrien Hi Judy, Matt (professional in this kind of work) and I met up yesterday afternoon and spent 3 1/2 hours working on the plaque. He explained there was a tremendous amount of build up from all the years of wax and protective spray. He stripped it down and now the image and the letters are in much better shape; he has been doing this work since 1998.

It is not done yet. It was a bit chilly and as you know the temp has to be right. So, for now the image, the wording and the outer frame have been restored. The background is stripped down but is green and oxidized but will be Part 2 of the restoration. Once that is done it will be sealed with a polyurethane spray and a special wax. Future care will only require a rinse and wax.

LATE SINGER JOHN DENVER HAD A PASSION FOR MUSIC, LIFE AND ACTIVISM: HE WAS A PURELY GOOD GUY

In 1997, the single-engine fiberglass plane Grammywinning singer John Denver was piloting off the coast of California suffered a catastrophic failure. It abruptly stalled in midair, plunged 500 feet and crashed into Monterey Bay, killing its only occupant. The "Take Me Home, Country Roads" crooner was just 53.

Despite the brevity of his life and career, John touched people's hearts with sincere, often joyful songs that reflected the world's beauty and the promise of true love. "He was a purely good guy, and people got that," his former business manager and close friend, Hal Thau, exclusively tells Closer. "You can't fake that."

John cared deeply about nature and the state of the world — he was an environmentalist long before it became fashionable — but he was also a complicated man. "It's not an easy thing to be sensitive, thoughtful, mindful and caring of so many things," another good friend, Bruce Gordon, the founder of the nonprofit EcoFlight, tells Closer in the magazine's latest issue, on newsstands now.

John's 1982 divorce from his first wife, Annie Martell — for whom he wrote the classic "Annie's Song" wounded him deeply. And like so many successful people, he found the demands of work often kept him away from his children, Zachary, Anna Kate and Jessie Belle. "He would talk about the kids all the time," says Gordon. "He would always miss the kids."



Born Henry John Deutschendorf Jr., the future writer of hits like "Rocky Mountain High" saw a lot of America as he moved from state to state due to his father's career in the Air Force. "His father was a colonel and a tough, stern guy," recalls Thau.

John's grandmother noted the boy's shyness and gifted him a Gibson guitar to keep him company. "Music is what opened the door for me," once said John, who spent his teen years in Fort Worth, Texas. "I was in a chorus class, and they asked me to bring my guitar to school one day, which I did, and all of a sudden people knew me."

But at home, the Emmy winner and his father didn't get along. "I ran away from home when I was a senior in high school," recalled the humanitarian, who found himself penniless shortly after he arrived in California. "Dad came out and got me, and we drove home together and talked a little bit, but I don't know that anything was really solved."

In college, John studied architecture, but he was drawn to the blossoming folk music scene of the early 1960s. He joined the Mitchell Trio for a time before setting out as a solo act. Along the way, he changed his surname to "Denver" for the capital of his favorite state, Colorado.

He released three solo albums and wrote "Leaving on a Jet Plane" (which became a hit for Peter, Paul and Mary) before his 1971 breakthrough Poems, Prayers & Promises introduced the world to John's signature songs, "Take Me Home, Country Roads" and "Sunshine on My Shoulders." He would go on to become the most successful solo artist on RCA Records after Elvis Presley. "I don't want to entertain people. I want to touch them," said John, whose 1973 Greatest Hits album stayed in the Top 200 for more than three years and sold more than 10 million copies.



John married Annie in 1967. They adopted two children, Zachary and Anna Kate, and eventually put down roots in Aspen, Colo. "He liked being at home," Gordon shares with Closer. "And he was happiest in nature — whether it was taking a walk, sitting by a waterfall or diving off one. He could dive off a 50-foot cliff and land it flawlessly."

His closest friends believe that Annie was the love of John's life, but it wasn't enough to hold them together. They divorced after 15 years of marriage. "Annie was becoming a therapist, and she wanted more out of the relationship in terms of John staying home," says Thau. It's been said that John sawed their marital bed in half in anger after their separation, but his friends insist he and Annie never stopped loving each other. "A lot of things are blown out of proportion," Thau reveals. "They were always good friends even after the divorce."



While John's private life knew many ups and downs his second marriage, to Cassandra Delaney, mother of his daughter Jessie Belle, also ended in divorce — his commitment to making the world a better place never wavered. After his showbiz career slowed down, he began devoting more time to environmental activism. "If he had lived, he would have been one of the biggest spokespeople on climate change," says Gordon. "A lot of people wanted him to run for office, but he felt like he could do more by influencing people without being a politician."

John's passing didn't end that hope. Today, his children are working with Brian Schwartz, an estate manager, to keep his legacy alive. "I grew up on John Denver's music," Schwartz tells Closer, explaining that he hopes to put together a feature film about the Grammy Hall of Famer's life, a documentary about his activism and a Broadway musical based on his songbook. "John left behind a legacy, not only of music but of his environmental and social activism," Schwartz says. "The biggest thing we are doing is making sure that his message continues to reach new audiences."

JOHN DENVER TREASURED HIS HOME LIFE WHEN HE WASN'T ON STAGE, PAL SAYS: 'HE WOULD MISS THE KIDS.'

The 'Rocky Mountain High' singer passed away in 1997 at age 53

Bruce Gordon's life was forever impacted after befriending John Denver.

The singer/songwriter, known for his sunny hits from the '70s such as "Rocky Mountain High" and "Sunshine on My Shoulders," was killed instantly in 1997 when his experimental plane crashed into Monterey Bay. He was 53.

His pal, the founder of the nonprofit EcoFlight, told Closer Weekly's latest issue that the star was a complex figure who cared deeply for the environment.

"It's not an easy thing to be sensitive, thoughtful, mindful and caring of so many things," Gordon told the outlet.

In his lifetime, Denver quickly became a beloved musical figure. Fourteen of his albums went gold and eight were ranked as platinum, with more than a million units sold. The LP "John Denver's Greatest Hits" is still one of the largest selling albums in the history of RCA Records, with worldwide sales of more than 10 million copies. He was also named Country Music Entertainer of the year in 1975.

But according to Gordon, it was his family - not success – that always came first for the star.

"He would talk about the kids all the time," Gordon told the outlet. "He would always miss the kids."

Denver is survived by three children: Jessie Belle, Anna Kate and Zachary.

According to Gordon, Denver devoted more of his time to environmental activism in his later years - and many people wondered if the star would pursue politics.

"A lot of people wanted him to run for office, but he felt like he could do more by influencing people without being a politician," he said.

In his lifetime, Denver made that sentiment known to the public.

"Music does bring people together," Denver once said. "'It allows us to experience the same emotions. People everywhere are the same in heart and spirit. No matter what language we speak, what color we are, the form of our politics or the expression of our love and our faith, music proves: We are the same."

Denver, a licensed pilot, was in a previous plane accident in April 1989. He walked away uninjured after the 1931 biplane he was piloting spun around while taxiing at an airport in northern Arizona.

"We are all very broken up over this," said family friend Jerry McClain at the time of Denver's death. "The person John was in public was the person he was personally."

And while the revered artist met a tragic end, his family is determined to keep his legacy alive.

According to the outlet, Denver's children are working with Brian Schwartz. The estate manager hopes to put together a film about Denver's life, as well as a documentary about his activism and a Broadway musical based on his songbook.

"John left behind a legacy, not only of music but of his environmental and social activism," Schwartz told the outlet. "The biggest thing we are doing is making sure that his message continues to reach new audiences."
